Local outbreak of measles in Victoria

There is an active outbreak of measles in Victoria after two new cases were reported in Melbourne. These cases have no history of overseas travel or known contact with other measles cases. These two new cases suggest local transmission of measles in Melbourne.

Measles is a viral illness that spreads easily. It often causes a rash and a fever and sometimes causes serious illness. It can be prevented through vaccination.

Your best protection is to have received two MMR vaccines, at least four weeks apart. Talk to your GP if you're born after 1965 and have not had TWO measles vaccines. Vaccines are free.

Free mpox vaccination available

The mpox vaccine is available for free in Vicotria to eligible people at Sexual Health Clinics, GPs, Aboriginal Health Services, public hospitals, community pharmacies, and some local councils.

Free vaccination against respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) for pregnant people

<u>Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV)</u> is a common cause of respiratory infections that affects all people, although infants are most at risk for serious illness. It is the main cause of hospital visits and breathing issues in babies.

The Western Public Health Unit strongly recommends pregnant people get the new maternal <u>RSV vaccine</u> to protect their babies from RSV after birth. The vaccine is free and administered between 28 and 36 weeks of pregnancy through:

- local general practices
- · community health or local council clinics in some areas
- · Aboriginal community health services
- pharmacies.

Infants who are at a higher risk for severe RSV will be eligible for the free RSV immunisation during the 2025 winter season.

The *Koori Way* is a statewide population health promotion campaign co-designed and led by multiple Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations across Victoria.

The 2025 anti-vaping campaign, *"Flip the Vape,"* has begun in Victoria for First Nation/Koori Victorians.

Vapes haven't been around for long, so we don't know all the long-term health effects yet. But we do know that vaping changes the way our lungs work, lowers immunity, may increase the risk of heart attack, and can impact fertility. Vaping is also highly addictive and can change young ones' lives forever.

<u>Flip the Vape - The Koori Way</u> is a resource by Mob for Mob to support quitting smoking and vaping for good.




Raising awareness of Hepatitis B in the west

The Western Public Health Unit (WPHU) has been working with the <u>Doherty Institute</u> to engage communities and raise awareness about Hepatitis B prevention in partnership with the <u>Centre for Ethnicity and Health</u> and <u>LiverWELL</u>.

Together, the partnership delivered four education sessions reaching over 80 community members in late 2024.
